LATEST RESEARCH

Online Pictures and Peer Pressure

Remember the old phrase "monkey see, monkey do?" It brings to mind the power of peer pressure, and the power of parental example. In terms of peer pressure, the desire to fit in

reaches its peak during the adolescent years. It should come as no surprise that in the age of social media new research from the University of Southern California claims that

teens are so impressionable that they can be influenced by what they see their friends doing online. In other words, those kids who see their friends drinking and smoking in pictures posted online are more likely to do the same thing themselves. But we can't forget that parental example can be an even more powerful influence in a young person's life. Your curious and impulsive kids will no doubt see peer examples that tempt them to join in. As parents, we must be diligent in our efforts to point our kids to God-honoring behaviors through our words and our example. Don't forget, your kids are watching!

ADULT EDUCATION

Genealogy. What do you know about your ancestors? Our daughter has always been interested in her family history, but just recently our son has expressed a desire to know where he came from. Who are those people who gave him life? Where are they buried? What stories do we know that we could tell him?

So, this past October, off we went to Iowa to explore the places and people that have helped to shape his life.

What do you know about your family history? Or, for our purposes here at church, what do you know about your spiritual family? Not just those folks who are members of Shepherd of the Prairie, but your wider church family--those who've helped you become who you are as a Christian?

Our church family is over 2000 years old! Who are those people, what are those events, that have made up the church? How have they made a difference in the world? Who are the heroes of the faith? And who have been the scoundrels? (Because, after all, when we start poking around our own family histories, it doesn't take long before we discover a horse thief or two!)

Beginning in 2014, we'll explore this history of our church family. Via DVD presentations by Dr. Timothy Paul Jones, a professor of church history, we'll go back to the beginning, and in 12 weeks, cover 20 centuries of our family--6 sessions now, and 6 later in the year. Following each 30-minute presentation, we'll have an opportunity for discussion and questions. Participant books will be available but aren't required for being in the class.

This new study will be available five times each week! **Sunday mornings at 9:00 and 10:30**, **Tuesday evenings at 7:00**, and **twice on Wednesday--at 11:00 in the morning, and 6:30 in the evening.**

So plan on joining us! We begin on **Sunday, January 19.**

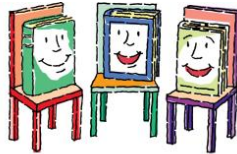

Book Chatters will meet at the church at **1 p.m. on Wednesday, January 15**. The book we will discuss is *The Book Thief* by Markus Zusak. The Wall Street Journal calls it "One of the most highly anticipated young-adult books in years." I am not sure just why it is listed as "young-adult," because at my tender young age I am finding it fascinating and beautifully written for folks of all ages. That being said, as a not-so-young adult, I feel that while reading, I am at an exhibit of either Monet or Van Gogh art -- examining one of either painter's masterpieces where he completed scenes by using lots of vibrant little dabs. Zusak paints with equally careful little strokes, developing characters with painstaking care. A special effect is that the author chose Death as his narrator. Before you get all horror stricken and turned off by that idea (as I almost did), let me warn you that Zusak's Death as narrator is a remarkable mixture of cynicism, realism, morality, tenderness, and wit.

SOTP MORTGAGE

Great news! The Prairie Crafters gave \$6,269.50 and we were able to add \$62,330.50 for a total of \$68,600.00 to be applied to our mortgage principal in December. That brings our loan balance down to \$932,992.67. Through the generosity of our congregation, the loan principal has been cut in half in four years. At this rate our loan could be paid off in 2018. Keep the contributions coming and the next hot topic at church will be "Expansion".
