Years ago, when I was developing a mission congregation in Texas, a mom and her two daughters worshipped with us on several Sunday mornings. No Dad. He was skeptical about the whole "church" thing. Finally, after much cajoling by his daughters, Dad agreed to attend one

Sunday if they promised to stop hassling him about it. He showed up as promised, and I called during the next week to set up an appointment to visit with Dad and his family. I'd hardly sat down, when Dad said to me, "I don't know anything about Lutherans. In one sentence tell me what you believe." Fortunately my mind was working well, and I said simply, "Lutherans believe we are saved by God's grace." And Dad and his family never missed a Sunday after that.

By God's grace. Amazing grace, indeed! But how is this grace lived out in daily life? How does this grace transform our lives so that we become the people God intends us to be? What does it mean to live by grace alone?

"Grace: An invitation to a Way of Life" will be our theme for adult education during this upcoming Lenten season. We'll begin the first Sunday in Lent, March 9, and continue our study through the week of April 13. Based on the 23rd Psalm, a book by the same title--**"Grace: An Invitation to a Way of Life"**, written by John Ortberg--will be our guide. Purchasing a book will be necessary for the study. The cost of each book is \$5. They will be available the first of March, and it will be important to read one chapter a week prior to having conversation around each weekly topic: Living in Grace, Grace for Regrets, Sustaining Grace, and so on.

We'll continue our pattern of meeting on Sunday mornings at 9:00 and 10:30, on Tuesday evenings at 7:00, and on Wednesday mornings at 11:00. Because of midweek Lenten worship, there won't be a class on Wednesday evening.

Plan to come join us and make this study of **amazing grace** a part of your Lenten journey!

So Lonely Together



With more and more families spending time in the same room while tethered to their smart phones and tablet devices, we may in fact be spending more physical time together as a family, while becoming more and more relationally detached.

We need to spend time with each other while disengaged from our devices. Without being mindful of this, we risk falling into the relational trap that researchers at Stanford University have discovered: that is, for every hour we spend engaged with our technology, our face-to-face interaction with others decreases by thirty minutes a day.

Here are three suggestions you can employ in your home that will help you to both disconnect and connect:

- Place a basket near the front door. Have everyone agree to put their smart phone in the basket when they walk into the house.
- Create no-phone zones. For example, agree to keep smart phones and other devices out of the family room so that the family can truly function to build connections in your family.
- Make meal-times about real-life connections and communication by agreeing to come to the table without any hand-held technology.

ALCOHOL MARKETING & TEENS

Back in 2003, the alcohol industry self imposed some standards designed to regulate the marketing of alcoholic beverages to underage TV viewers. A new report from the CDC and the Center on Alcohol Marketing and Youth at Johns Hopkins University has found that the alcohol industry has violated its own rules. In twenty-five of the nation's largest television markets, almost one in four alcohol ads violates the standard which prohibits ads when the under twenty-one audience exceeds 28.4 percent. With alcohol advertising as a prevalent part of our kids media diet, we need to pay attention and look for opportunities to talk about ads that promote attitudes, behaviors, and habits that see alcohol consumption as necessary and fun. The reality is that for the alcohol industry to survive, they must engage in the practice of cultivating new drinkers. Parents, you need to respond by cultivating your child's ability to see through these manipulative efforts.

Moral Relativism

Here's a little phrase you may have heard from your teen in one form or another in response to your efforts to provide parental guidance and direction: "That may be ok for you. But it's not right for me." Welcome to the world of moral relativism. Your kids have been encouraged to create truth for themselves.

In their world, the only rule is that there are no rules. It's up to the individual to determine what is right and what works for them. Take a look around and you'll see evidence of teens living under the authority of self as they make all kinds of lifestyle choices. The end result of the loss of this shared moral compass is anarchy. While moral relativism makes our parenting task that much harder, we must confront it whenever it rears its ugly head in our kids' lives. Always be ready to lovingly and gracefully point out the contrast between God's never-changing standards, and the fluid ever-changing personal "truths" of moral relativism.



Latest Research

Sports Dropout

Researchers at Michigan State University report that 70% of kids who play youth sports drop out by the age of 13. The reason?

Too much pressure from parents and a society who put a premium on athletic ability, performance, and winning. Sadly, many of these dropouts are gifted athletes who should

be developing their God-given athletic gifts and abilities long into the teen years. Others are late bloomers whose discouragement leads them to hang it up, causing them to miss out on the years of successful play that could be theirs if they would only be encouraged to hang in there long enough for their bodies and skills to develop. Then there are those who continue on while allowing the pressure to excel to lead them to try to get an edge through cheating and/or performance enhancing drugs. The youth sports landscape is not good. Ask yourself, "Am I putting too much athletic pressure on my kids?" Make sure your expectations are reasonable.

CREATION RESTORATION 4.0



Our youth mission trip team has a heart to take care of the creation that God has given us, and a desire for serving others. In Genesis, after God created Heaven and Earth, sky and water, and, plants and animals, He created man and woman, and then placed them in the garden to take care of it. Additionally, when Jesus was asked what the greatest commandment is, His response was “Love God with all of your heart, soul and mind, and love your neighbor as yourself”. We will be modeling these two passages with our upcoming mission trip. From June 15th to June 24th, we’ll be travelling to the

Yellowstone National Park area to grow in our faith and to serve those who are less fortunate. In addition to all of the great things we’ll see and do while we are at Yellowstone, we will be serving the community of Cody, Wyoming. Cody is a town of about 10,000 people, with many people living below the poverty level. We will do home repairs for people who don’t have the funds or physical ability to do things for themselves. We also hope to construct a playground near a ministry center in one of the poorest neighborhoods. We’d like to ask for your support, by specifically praying for:

- The team’s preparation for the trip.
- The team’s safety – while travelling and while serving in Wyoming.
- The continued passion for our youth to serve those who are less fortunate
- The successful accomplishment of our mission to help those in need.

In the upcoming months, we’ll be holding several fundraisers, which you may wish to be a part of, in order to help fund our trip. You can purchase gift cards, to stores you normally shop at, from our table at church. We get a small percentage for all gift cards that are purchased through us. LENTEN OFFERING

Lutheran Outdoor Ministry Center

Half of the Lenten Offering (Ash Wednesday, Lent, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday) will be sent to LOMC. It is a year-round camp and retreat facility and ministry of the three Evangelical Lutheran Church in America synods in Illinois. Located on 640 acres of hills, prairies, pond and forests near Oregon, Illinois, it offers experiences connecting the Word of God with the World of God. Programs for youth, adults, families, and congregations are offered. Many of our SOTP youth and adults have attended programs at LOMC, and SOTP hosted the LOMC Swing Choir a couple of years ago.

We have an opportunity to learn more about LOMC when Russ Senti, Executive Director of LOMC, will speak at our Lenten Wednesday Service on April 2. You can check out the LOMC website at <http://www.lomc.org/>.

Senior Care Volunteer Network (formerly Faith in Action)

Half of the Lenten Offering will be sent to the Senior Care Volunteer Network, which assists our senior neighbors in McHenry County and Sun City to live independently in their own homes. Last year 375 volunteers provided the following no-cost services for 1000 seniors: 220,000 miles of transportation, 24,000 volunteer hours (such as respite for caregivers, companionship) 16,000 unique services (such as home and yard maintenance). Exodus World Service is grassroots organization representing a wide range of denominational backgrounds. We unite our different gifts in the ministry to "welcome the stranger" and "love our neighbors as ourselves." Refugees from all over the world have had to leave their homes for political and religious reasons (think Syria). Millions end up living in dire conditions in refugee camps. Some are able to come to the United States to build a new life. Organizations like Exodus World Service provide assistance in that transition. We at SOTP are involved. Our Welcome to America Collections have welcomed four families to the Chicago area, including the **Rai** Family from Nepal, the **Lai** Family from Malaysia, the **Toma** Family from Iraq, and the **Sabree** Family from Syria.

A NOTE FROM OUR FINANCE TEAM



General Fund Notes

Through January, operating revenues exceed expenses. Member contributions exceed budget primarily due to Prepaid Pledges of \$15,480.00 from 2013 being recognized in 2014. Expenses are over budget primarily due to the expense categories headed Facilities and Church Insurance in Other Church Expenses account for approximately \$6,600.00 expenses in excess of Budget . These expenses should even out as we spread it over the next six months for insurance and the full twelve months for Facilities.

Thanks to your faithful giving we have reduced our building loan by over \$1,000,000 in slightly over 4 years.
