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A Note From Pastor Mark

Dear Christian Friends,

Welcome to summer, a great time to reflect, refresh and renew your call to ministry through the church. Please don't neglect your time in worship on the weekends. Worship is vital to our spiritual health and wellness and the best way for us to hear where God may be leading you in life.

When Jesus heard that John had been imprisoned (Matthew 4), he returned to Galilee. His time had come. As John had preached the preparatory message of repentance, Jesus now began making possible our living out the transformed life of which John had spoken. As Matthew continues, he reminds his readers that all of this was according to God's plan—the light that had been promised was here.

Jesus had already been preaching and healing; now it's time to choose disciples. It was customary at that time for students to choose a rabbi (teacher). Instead, Jesus chose them—an act of grace—calling fishermen to become fishers of men. How they must have wondered, and yet, they immediately left their nets and followed him. They didn't understand what Jesus' kingdom was all about, but they followed. They continued to question, but they followed.

Doesn't God call us in the same way?

- asking us to turn to God and God's plan;
- to leave our wrong assumptions of what his kingdom should be;

- to move out of our comfort zone into places where we don't always feel qualified;
- trusting that as we respond and open our hearts to God, God promises to transform our lives even as the lives of the disciples were transformed.

This was a time of leaving—Jesus left Nazareth for Capernaum; the disciples left their nets. We are all at difference places in our lives in relationship to Christ. Some of us have left the work force or changed the career we've pursued for years; children have left our homes; we've left those homes to live somewhere smaller, requiring less maintenance or seeking a more favorable climate; those whom we love have gone on ahead to their eternal home, leaving us. Others of us are leaving home for the first time, off to college, purchasing a first home, preparing for marriage, preparing to be a mother or father for the first time. And yet, even now and wherever we find ourselves, Jesus comes to us and says, "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men." God's plan continues and God has chosen us for that kingdom.

We're to follow as the disciples did even now—or perhaps, especially now. Take time over these months to seek the Spirit's call to ministry. Where is our Lord calling you to serve? Step out and boldly give of yourself in love to Christ for the sake of others.

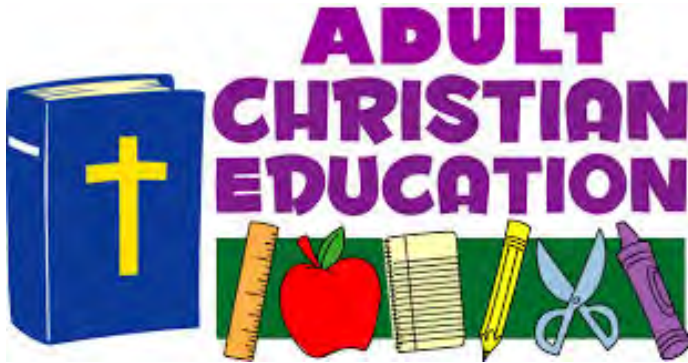

Contrary to the belief we've somehow come to hold that deciding to follow Jesus is the path to a happy and easy life where we inherit the entitlement of a pain-free and problem-free existence, the Scriptures speak from beginning to end about the presence and benefits of suffering. The Bible teaches us that suffering and difficulty lead to spiritual growth, a deeper understanding of and dependency on God, and even Salvation.

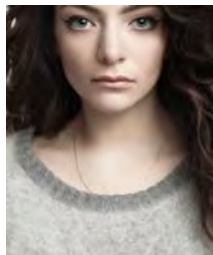
James tells us that we are to "consider it pure joy, my brothers, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance," which lead us to maturity (James 1:2&3). Many of our teens find adolescence to be a painful and trying time. It becomes the same for us. Together with our kids, we can experience the joy of going deeper with God in dependence on Him during the confusing and often turbulent period of adolescence.

Michael Card reminds us that "the path to God is through the wilderness. There, and only there, will we learn what God is truly worth. There we discover His provision: manna, quail, living water. But more significantly, along this path we experience His Presence and discover it is more precious than His provision." From a human perspective, these are the times when God does his best work in our lives. Their growing up is an opportunity for us to grow up. . . and for us to model to them what it means to grow up in Christ. If helplessness comes through adolescence taking the form of "the wilderness" in your home, embrace it. In fact, I would suggest that we even pray for the blessing of suffering to come.

Self-Validation Via Selfies

When your teenager posts one of those social media self-portraits known as a selfie, chances are they will follow-up the post by waiting to see and evaluate the feedback. What they're looking for is immediate feedback that is positive in nature as that kind of feedback is like money in the bank. In effect, they are looking to collect feedback that serves as social capital that validates them as they try to discover the image that makes them most appealing to their friends. The problem is that looking for validation through selfies is a dangerous and misdirected endeavor. Instead, they should work to develop their inward character qualities and virtues, all for the sole purpose of seeking to become more and more like Jesus Christ, and then living not for the audience of their peers, but for the audience of the one true God. Parents, monitor how and where your kids are fishing for validation. Begin by examining your own online habits. Your example and encouragement speak loudly to your kids.

Smartphone Use

One of the subtle dangers related to emerging trends and fads is that with the passage of time, what was once new quickly becomes normal. This is an important principle for us to remember as parents. You see, if we aren't paying attention, we might let down our parent guards

and allow our kids to engage in pursuits without first establishing boundaries that can protect them from harm and provide for their well-being.

One of these shifts that's now occurring relates to technology. With smart phone technology now dominating the mobile communications market, we need to be aware that 70% of teens ages 13 to 17 use smartphones. What this means is that Internet access is a 24/7 possibility. Gone are the days when kids would only be able to access the Internet on the family room computer. Operating Budget Year-to-Date as of April 30, 2014:

General Fund Income:	\$ 186,578.54	\$ 171,780.00
General Fund Expenses:	\$ 167,191.82	\$ 171,772.00
Net Income:	\$ 19,386.72	\$ 8.00

General Fund Notes: Through April, operating revenues exceed expenses. Member contributions continue to exceed budget primarily due to Prepaid Pledges of \$15,480.00 from 2013 being recognized in January 2014. Expenses are over budget in the categories headed Facilities, Equipment Rental, and Church Insurance in Other Church Expenses account. These insurance expenses should even out as we spread it over the next six months. Facilities Lawncare/Snow Removal is in excess of budget because of the number of snow events we have had this year. Overall General Fund Expenses are under Budget YTD \$4,586.18 primarily in the Staffing Ministry expense category and current no funding in Providing for the future accounts (normally funded at year end with any surplus).
