### A Note From Pastor Mark

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Have you ever found yourself in a pitch dark place? You cannot see anything. It is difficult to sense your relationship to anything around you for you cannot see. When you cannot see, it's difficult to relate. You feel isolated and alone.

Epiphany is that moment in the church year when we discover that it is in the midst of darkness that light shines. Isaiah chapter 60 records the prophet's words, "For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples" (vs. 2a).

This is a picture of hopelessness and abandonment. It describes the condition of the people of Israel as they were taken into exile by Babylon. But soon there will be hope. "Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you" (Isaiah 60:1).

It is God's doing and action which brings light to total darkness. The dark days of exile in Babylon will be left behind. Then the purpose of God's people will be fulfilled. All peoples will be drawn to them through the light of God. The prophet declares, "Nations shall come to your light" (Isaiah 60:3a).

Epiphany is the season of the church year when we celebrate the light that drew the Magi or Wiseman to the Christ Child. In the Christian story, people from other nations would come to see the light of the newborn child who comes to save. As we in the northern hemisphere live in a time of darkness with short winter days, we are reminded that light is what gives us hope, too.

We seek the light, both spiritually and physically. We have learned that

without the light we literally become sad, even hopeless. But with light we grow strong and more hopeful.

The light of God's grace comes to us and we are reminded again that we cannot live without it.

I hope you will join us on Wednesday, January 6 (celebration service at 6:30 p.m. and dinner from 5:30 p.m. -6:15 p.m.) We will celebrate

Epiphany and experience an epiphany unveiling and giving light to what we are to build in order to give God glory!



#### Trends SEXTING

Researchers at Drexel University are reporting that sexting among young people is actually more prevalent than was previously thought. More than half of those young adults surveyed reported that they when they were minors they exchanged sexually explicit text messages, with or

without photographic images. The study also found that the majority of our kids are not aware of the legal ramifications of underage sexting. In fact, most respondents were not aware that in many

places, sexting among minors can be considered trafficking in child pornography, which is an offense that can be prosecuted. Nor did they realize the extent to which prosecution can go, with many offenders having to serve jail time and/ or register as a sex offender. Of course, our first responsibility is to help our kids see their sexuality as a good gift from God that should only be indulged within the context of a monogamous, heterosexual marriage. In addition, we must warn them about

## Latest Research OUTDOOR PLAY

Those who track the health and well-being of our children and teens are regularly reminding us that fewer and fewer kids are involved in self-organized play. In addition, many kids stay inside, engaged with media and video games. Consequently, they don't get outside for recreation and exercise

with their friends.
And, we are
constantly being told
that childhood
obesity is a national
epidemic. A recent
study of Canadian
parents and teens

reflects a shift in outdoor play and recreation that's taking place south of the Canadian border as well. Teens are spending only 7.9 hours a week being active outdoors. In contrast, their parents grew up spending about 17.5 hours outside each and every week. The benefits of outdoor activity to their emotional, physical, and even spiritual health are significant. Leading a sedentary lifestyle takes a toll on the body and the brain. Encourage your kids to care for their God-given bodies through exercise and play.

## Sexual Integrity More Reasons You Need To Talk About Sex

The world around you is already talking about IT.

Two out of every three shows on TV include sexual content. Only one in ten of those shows speak of the risks or consequences associated with early sexual activity. Further, the average age youth are first exposed to pornography is 11 years old. You may think you are protecting your child by monitoring what they watch or listen to, but even if they only watch the evening news, your son or daughter is receiving a sex education.

If YOU don't, someone else will.

More than half of 7th to 12th graders say they have looked up health information online in order to learn more about an issue affecting them or someone they know. In addition, the websites teens turn to most have inaccurate information or communicate values different than what their parents would share if given the opportunity.

God is not quiet on this subject - you should not be either.

Genesis I ends the creation story by saying, "God saw all He had made, and it was very good." In the original language the closing line is melodic. It has a rhythm to it. It's as if God is singing over his brand new world – it

is very good. Sex is a part of this creation. Often we can forget this and treat it as something different or set apart, but it too was very good. Over and over again this is how scripture speaks of and protects the boundary of this gift by communicating its purpose within the covenant of marriage.



#### FROM THE WORD...

James reminds Christ's followers of this truth: "Faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead" (James 2:17). Sadly, our me-centered culture feeds an all-too-often accepted mutation of true Christian faith that is me-glorifying and self-centered, rather than God-glorifying and other-centered. Equally sad is how this self-centeredness manifests itself at the very time when we celebrate the birth of the One who told us that it is "more blessed to give, than to receive." This Christmas, why not battle the materialism of the age by encouraging your children and teenagers to help others by getting involved in a social cause or missions endeavor as a family. By modeling selfless involvement in mission and service projects, you will grow a desire in your kids to make a difference through service to others in the name of Christ. As their interest grows, enable them to take opportunities to participate in short-term mission projects on a local, national, and international scale. Experience shows

that one of the most effective ways to build and cement the faith of teenagers is to involve them in missions and service. As a family, bring your faith to life by putting it into action.

#### TALKING ABOUT ALCOHOL WITH KIDS

Over the years, we've seen how emerging youth culture realities have harmed our kids. In many cases, issues like social media, television-viewing, and body image pressures have led the American Academy of Pediatrics to offer guidelines to physicians. For example, two years ago the AAP directed pediatricians to challenge parents to keep screens of all types away from kids during the first two years of life. Now, the AAP is instructing pediatricians to encourage parents to talk about the dangers of alcohol use and abuse by the age of nine. Surveys indicate that children start to think positively about alcohol between the ages of nine and



thirteen. And, the more they are exposed to alcohol advertising, the more likely they are to drink. We commend this recommendation as alcohol is the substance most frequently abused by kids in the United States. Help your kids understand God's will and way regarding the health of their bodies, the dangers of alcohol abuse, and obeying the law.

We are now accepting registrations for the 2016-2017 school year.



General Fund Notes: Through November, operating income was more than expenses by \$26,303.49. Member contributions are over budget by \$2,822.83. Expenses are under budget \$37,640.04. Overall General Fund Income is more than Expenses to Budget YTD \$38,670.49 primarily due to unfunded Provision Accounts \$14,212.00 and reduced staffing costs of \$16,852.30. We continue to encourage the restraint of staff and mission teams in their spending in the various expense categories.
