BUILDING TEAM UPDATE

At Wednesday's Lenten service, Pastor Mark indicated that there's Good News, and there's Bad News for the Building Team. The Good News is that the construction industry is booming. The Bad News is that... the construction business is booming!



As Pastor Marks said, the bids for the new sanctuary and Mission Center expansion came in higher than expected. These higher bids are largely attributable to:

- 1) A recent surge in material prices, and
- 2) The strong construction activity in our area limited the number of available sub-contractors.

Pastor Mark also stated that the Building Team has been hard at work for the last several weeks with our Construction Manager and Architects to Value Engineer our project and bring it within budget. On Friday, March 24th, your Building Team met for 3 ½ hours to do just that.

We are pleased to report to you that the Value Engineering process has resulted in significant progress in lowering project costs! However, the Building Team feels that there are more opportunities to reduce costs and also attract more bidders. **To take full advantage of these opportunities, the planned Congregational Meeting and Ground Breaking scheduled for April will be rescheduled for a future date: Probably May or early June.**

Please continue to keep the Building Team in your prayers. We thank you for your patience in this most important sanctuary and Mission Center expansion. The new dates for the congregational meetings will be announced as soon as the value engineering process is completed.

Ministry Musings

Sorry

I can remember when my children were young and one of them would say or do something “mean” or wrong to their sibling and I would take the child who had done the wrong and stand them in front of the sibling and say, “Tell them you are **sorry**”. The child would say a feeble, “**sorry**”, and I would make the two of them hug. I am sure most of the time they were **sorry** alright, not that they had hurt the other but that mom had caught them at it!



God encourages us to confess our sin to one another and to ask not only him, but those we have harmed for forgiveness. James 5:16 says, “Make this your common practice: Confess your sins to each other and pray for each person so that you can live together whole and healed. The prayer of a person living right is something powerful to be reckoned with.” (The Message). When the problem is out in the open, the wound can be acknowledged and then healed. And as with a broken bone, the healed area can be even stronger than it was before.

It is hard to admit to somebody that we have wronged them. Often, we hope that if we ignore the hurt and/or the broken relationship it will simply go away. In reality the relationship won’t go back to normal until we can talk it out, apologize (say **sorry**), and offer and receive forgiveness.

But there are times when we have been wronged by someone and they may be blissfully unaware that they have wronged us, or we have wronged someone without being aware of it. All we see is that the relationship has been strained, the comfortableness between us is stretched thin and we or they may not know why.

Someone hurts us; someone does us wrong. For sure, that person is wrong for doing what they did, and we may have a reason to feel hurt. But without **sorry** and forgiveness what often happens? We may start to hold a grudge and begin to feel bitter, angry. We play the hurt over and over in our minds; nursing it, helping it to grow and take on a life of its own. Eventually we may even begin to justify our anger and unforgiveness and enlarge the hurt out of proportion. Often, we start to feel superior; assuring ourselves that we would never treat

another person like that, let alone a friend. We may refuse to forgive and that allows our inner being to begin to change as our inner climate warms in anger and cools in the bitterness that comes from unforgiveness.

While the other person was absolutely wrong to do what they did, our response to the wound can also be very unwise. Rather than cleaning the wound with **sorry**, putting on the salve of forgiveness, and allowing the wound to heal, we keep picking at the scab and let the injury fester and become infected. While the wound wasn't our fault, the infection certainly may be. And many times, the infection spreads and our whole attitude and soul becomes diseased with bitterness and judgement.

Paul tells us in Romans 12:18, "If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone!". How much more freeing and healing it is to forgive; get the salve on the wound and let it heal. And yes, even if the other person doesn't ask for forgiveness or say **sorry!**



TOO MUCH ME- WALT MUELLER, CPYU PRESIDENT

“Oh, how cute!” I watched as a couple of adoring grandmotherly types stopped in the store to admire the little toddler being pushed by her mother through the aisles. Yes, the little girl was quite cute. But I’m not so sure about the graphic T-shirt she was wearing. Her T-shirt loudly proclaimed, “It’s All About Me!” As I walked away I wondered to myself, “If that’s how that mother is treating her daughter, how will that notion mis-shape and destroy her life?” Okay, okay. It’s just a T-shirt. But its message is one that we increasingly live out in today’s world. . . and that’s not a good thing. Isn’t that what got us into trouble in the first place? Everything was perfect for our first parents as they inhabited the Garden given to them by God as a place for them to live to His glory. But all that goodness came undone as our first parents ushered corruption into the world by giving in to the tempter’s invitation to be like God. By making it all about themselves and bowing to the idol of “me, myself, and I,” our first parents set the course that each of us have followed. Sadly, when we share with our kids the lifegiving corrective offered in the words of Jesus when He invites us to “deny yourself, take up your cross, and follow me” (Matthew 16:24), our kids filter His words through a culture that consistently screams the exact opposite message. Marketing messages foster entitlement by encouraging our kids to satisfy their personal wants and desires without care or concern for others. The Apostle Paul warned the young Timothy that in the “last days” (using the present tense to indicate the here and now) people would become “lovers of their own selves” rather than “lovers of God” (II Timothy 3). In today’s youth culture, we see this reality encouraged, embraced, and lived out in three ways.



First, there is the emergence of Narcissism. Rooted in the story from Greek mythology about the young self-obsessed Narcissus, Narcissism is defined as self-love, vanity, conceit, arrogance, and self-centeredness. Our children and teens are susceptible to this because of where they’re at in their development. Ego-centrism, if you remember, is a huge reality during our growing up years. This combines with the cultural push to indulge and serve self to push them away from a desire to deny self and follow Jesus. Second,

there is “expressive individualism.” This is the now commonly-held belief that a person’s highest loyalty is to himself or herself. True happiness is achieved through being true to what one feels like at any given moment in time. Consequently, there is little or no regard for Scripture, parental authority, or the call to follow Jesus. Third, the current cultural focus on self has led to the fluidity of identity. The Scriptures teach us that freedom comes in finding one’s identity and place in Christ. . . which leads to a desire to conform to His will and His way. The culture encourages us to place ourselves at the center of our lives and universe. As a result, we have the freedom to choose our source of meaning, free from any outside borders, boundaries, constraints, and influences. We call this “authenticity.” Parents, to nurture our kids in the faith requires us to know both Word and world. The world is pushing our kids to love themselves with reckless abandon. Sadly, that is not the way to life. Instead, the Word offers the way, the truth, and the life through self-denial. Are you pointing your kids to a life of bringing glory to God, or a life that brings glory to self?

FROM THE WORD....

What is our purpose in life? We discover our true purpose and identity when we see ourselves as individuals made in the image of God for a relationship with God. The way into that relationship with God is through following Jesus. Have you ever paused to ponder the wonder of God’s grace? Isn’t it amazing that He has provided a way back into relationship, purpose, and identity through Jesus Christ? Following Jesus is the path to life and salvation. In Matthew 16:24, Jesus calls us to deny ourselves and “follow” Him. When Jesus called His first disciples to “follow” it was not a suggestion, but a command (Matthew 4:19). One Bible scholar says that the word “follow” is “the Disciple’s word.” It’s the word that’s the key to life. It’s the word used to describe a soldier who follows their leader or commander. It’s also the word used to describe attaching one’s self to someone, or to “stick to” someone. Parents, Jesus uses the word “follow” to summon you and your children to Himself. It involves an act of self-denial and surrender that includes both a cost and a cross. But ultimately, it is the only way to freedom in this life and the next.

Selfies, Self-esteem and satisfaction

The word selfie wasn't even a part of our vocabulary fifteen years ago. Now, selfies, selfie-taking, and selfie-curating are taking up huge amounts of our time. For our kids who have been born into our self-obsessed culture, taking and posting selfies is a part of their daily routine. Researchers are now discovering that we are spending lots of time viewing other people's selfies. The result is not benign. It seems that the more a person views their own and other's selfies, the lower their level of self-esteem and life satisfaction. Of course more research needs to be done on why this is, but we can speculate that we are basing our value and worth on how our selfies and the online response measures up to the amount of likes and comments posted on other people's selfies. Why is it that we are so obsessed with comparing ourselves to others? Parents, we must teach our kids to live to the glory and honor of the audience of one. That would reduce so much pressure.



Latest Research

Dating Abuse Through Technology

As our children and teens integrate smartphones and other devices into their lives at younger and younger ages, we must become increasingly diligent in not only monitoring the way they use these devices, but in setting borders and boundaries. In effect, it is our parental responsibility to both protect our kids from being harmed, and from harming others.

Researchers at the University of Texas have found that fifteen percent of sixth graders report that they have perpetrated at least one form of abuse toward a dating partner through technology. Of course, the fact that sixth graders even have dating partners is cause for concern in and of itself. The most common form of dating abuse was using a partner's social media account without their permission, and instilling fear in the partner if calls or messages were not answered and returned. Our Christian kids need to learn that they are to follow Jesus onto the digital frontier. Are you monitoring your kids and teaching them how to be digital disciples?

FINANCIAL NEWS

Treasurer's Report as of February 28, 2017

Thanks to your faithful and generous support the mission of Shepherd of the Prairie is off to a successful start in 2017. Through February operating income exceeded expenses by \$2,636. Contributions slightly missed the budgeted amount by \$77 and expenses were slightly under the budgeted amount by \$3,763.

As of February 28th the Building Fund Balance was \$ 716,830. During the month of February we received donations of \$32,275. This included \$31,639 to our Forward in Faith campaign and \$60 to our FORWARD campaign. Building Fund expenses for the month were \$34,423 and Year-to-date expenses were \$85,088. The Loan Balance on our existing property is \$472,946.
