A Note From Pastor Mark

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Our midweek Lenten themes this year are taken from the hymn penned by Fanny Crosby, "Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross." The words of this familiar hymn express well the unconditional grace and mercy of God. That grace of God is probably expressed no better than in the parable of the waiting father. The story was a part of my morning devotions today and in the parable, the younger son is anxious to go out into the world and live it up. The constraints of living at home must have seemed unbearable. So he asks for his inheritance.

You would think the father would stop him and refuse to give him the inheritance. After all, any father seeing his son ready to blow his inheritance would want to protect him from himself. But not this father! He gives him what he wants. Then the father waits.

Day after day he must wonder what is happening to his son. But the days go by. Nothing happens. No word is heard. No communication. Meanwhile, the young son is out in the world making one bad decision after the other. He loses all his father gave him. His stewardship of the inheritance is a failure. He's reduced to living as a slave slopping the pigs.

The good news in this story is voiced in the words, "... when he came to himself." He realizes his life is a failure.

Some today would say he hit bottom. The best he can do is to imagine returning to his father in order to be one of his father's slaves. Thus he returns hoping to be a slave in his own home.

The waiting father, seeing his son return, rejoices. He cares nothing about getting an accounting of his son's wasteful ways. He will hear nothing of making him a slave. Instead, the father pulls out all the stops. He holds nothing back. He embraces his lost son and celebrates by slaughtering the fatted calf. He makes an extravagant party celebrating that his lost son is found. The father's generous spirit is never hardened or made bitter by his son's irresponsibility. Instead, the father remains unconditional in his love, unconditional in his grace, consistent in spiritual integrity and welcoming to the returning son many would regard as worthless.

During this Lenten season as God points us in the direction of unconditional grace, mercy and love (Good Friday), I hope you will make worship a priority in your life. Join us in community, through worship, fellowship and service. Be watching, waiting and listening for God's word of grace to fall fresh upon you.

Ministry Musings



I've been reading through Mark this year and recently read the story about James and John asking Jesus if they could have seats of power and importance when he came into his glory. (Mark 10: 35-45). Jesus doesn't berate them for asking but

does ask if they can share his cup. I began to think about how much we often want to participate in Jesus' glory without dealing with the suffering.

Many of us like to find ourselves in positions of leadership and/or power. Human nature includes the desire to be in charge; in control of our situation and if at all possible, in control of the actions of those

around us. We want things our way. That can just as easily be seen in the child who says; "play it my way or I'll take my ball and go home", and in the adult who says, "we've always done it that way, we can't change it now!".

In all of Mark chapter 10, Jesus challenges his disciples, the early church and us to rethink our natural tendencies for power and to relinquish our need for control. He has called for his followers to upend the acceptable norms and practices in marriage and divorce (vs 2-12); in the status of children and the lowly (vs 13-16); and in possessions and wealth (vs 17-30). Now he broaches the subject of power and control.

During his time on earth Jesus was continually talking about the kingdom of God. Many of his parables began with the words, "the kingdom of God is like...". He wasn't just speaking about "heaven" or the time after the final resurrection. He was talking about the kingdom of heaven that begins here and now, "on earth as it is in heaven". We as the church are to be the evidence of Jesus' resurrection, the foretaste of the final reveal of the kingdom of God.

The substance of the here and now kingdom is the upside-down view of the world seen in Jesus' teachings. He said that to be the greatest in the kingdom is to be the servant of all. The commentary I read on the story of James and John trying to maneuver into seats of power and glory said, "real ministry is never about where you sit; rather it is ultimately about how you serve.". That made me stop and think.

Jesus calls us to a new way of ministry that differs from the world; whoever is greatest among us must be wiling to serve those who are the least among us. Who are the least? They include the person who is left economically and socially devastated, the child who is powerless against abuse or poverty, the person who is homeless and destitute in a society that values the gainfully employed, the victims of prejudice and hate, the sick or those with special needs in a world that esteems the able bodied.

We are reminded by Jesus' words to worry less about leading the parade and work more to improve the lives of the poor and the marginalized in society.

THE BARNABAS CAREGIVING PROGRAM

THE FIRST DUTY OF LOVE IS TO LISTEN - Paul Tillich



As you may know, the ELCA's Comprehensive Ministry Review Team spent a weekend with Shepherd of the Prairie last October. One of the recommendations they had for SOTP was that we begin a Barnabas Caregiving Ministry here. We are taking the first steps to make that happen and this can be an exciting step in ministry for SOTP.

WHAT IS THE BARNABAS CAREGIVING PROGRAM?

It is a simple, effective program for training volunteers to give care in most institutional and home situations. Giving care means having conversations with those who are homebound, in care facilities or facing some of life's most difficult seasons to provide a listening ear and encouragement to those who need to be heard and cared for.

The ministry is named after Barnabas, the apostle first mentioned in the book of Acts (4:36-37) who encouraged the twelve by selling a piece of property and laying a gift of the money at their feet. In their gratitude the renamed him "Bar- Nabas" – "Son of Encouragement". Barnabas later traveled with Paul in bringing care and continued encouragement, along with the gospel, to the gentile world.

WHAT IS A BARNABAS MINISTER AND WHAT DO THEY DO?

A Barnabas Minister is a skilled listener who encourages others by that listening. They are trained in how to listen effectively, how to build relational skills, and in how to encourage others. They will also be trained to bring Communion from the Assembly to the special person they visit.

THERE ARE SEVERAL WAYS TO SERVE AS A BARNABAS MINISTER:

- Caring for a loved one in your home
- Caring for a congregational member who is homebound
- Caring for a congregational member in a care facility
- Serving on a hospital visitation team
- Caring for a person dealing with a life issue

After training, each trainee will be able to choose whether or not they wish to make a commitment to be a Barnabas Minister, and what form of service that will take. MAKE THE MOST OF IRA-TO-CHURCH DONATIONS

It's EASIER THAN EVER TO GIVE TO CHARITY FROM YOUR IRA, since Uncle Same made the qualified charitable distribution, or QCD, permanent in 2015. Here are answers to some of the common questions Retirement Report readers ask us about this taxsaving move.

Qualified Charitable Distribution TAX BENEFITS

Can any traditional IRA owner take a qualified charitable distribution? You must be age 70 1/2 or older to do a QCD. Those who qualify can give up to \$100,000 from their IRA directly to charity.

How does this move cut my tax bill? QCD money is not included in your adjustd gross income and that's "the main advantage," says Mark Luscombe, prinpal analyst in the tax and accounting business of Wolters Kluwer, in Riverwoods, IL. The lower your AGI, the lower your tax bill will be.

Reining in AGT-which is your income before subtracting exemptions and deductions- acan also help maximize other tax breaks. Lower AGI might also help you avoid or limit Medicare Part B premium surcharges.

Can a QCD count as my annual required minimum distribution? Yes, but you must time the move properly because the first dollars coming out of your IRA for theyear count toward your RMD. For the QCD to fulfill part or all of your RMD, the QCD needs to be done before you satisfy your annual RMD.

Can I give money to the charity myself? The money must be directly transferred to the charity from your IRA.

How do I report a QCD on my tax return? At tax time, report your total IRA distributions for the year on line 15a on Form 1040. Then subtract the QCD and report the remainder (even if it's \$0) on line 15b. Write "QCD" next to line 15b so the IRS knows why the numbers don't match.

This has been a BIG undertaking for the members of SOTP and your generous pledges, gifts, memorials, and prayers are bringing it all together.

As we take the next step with completing the vision for the new sanctuary, office shell, restrooms, hospitality center and music room/ classroom shell we bring before you other needs that will be necessary to complete this first phase of the entire project.

Our ministry leaders will be making a list of items including furniture/ audio-visual equipment, and needs for the hospitality center, sacristy, and yes, even the janitor's closets. We are calling these items FAITH ITEMS and that's where we all come in. We will soon have a published list and you'll have the opportunity to commit to donating the funds needed for these items.

Although we will not be able to place name plaques on Faith Items there will be a memorial book printed with your gift item noted as a memorial for loved ones; to honor someone; or perhaps to commemorate a special occasion for loved ones. You will have the opportunity to donate a faith items but please realize that the items on the faith list have been carefully selected to coordinate with the new addition and no substitutes or used items can be accepted.

There are many opportunities to give from expensive equipment to basic needs like chairs. Your Complete Guide to Parenting a 17 Year Old

Watching a child transform into a soon-to-be adult can stir up mixed emotions for many parents. And although most 17 year olds exhibit a lot of maturity, they still require a fair



amount of guidance. The key to successfully parenting a 17-yearold starts by understanding your child's development.

EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Turning 17 represents an interesting fork in the road for many teens. Some of them take off on a smooth path toward adulthood.

They become increasingly responsible and they're eager to become independent.

Others, however, struggle with the realities of pending adulthood. Some of them seem lost and confused over the future. They may struggle to show responsibility with their homework, chores, and daily responsibilities and may feel fearful about becoming an adult.

SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

Friends are still very important to teens at this age. Your teen may spend the vast majority of her free time with friends and when she's home, she may prefer to be in her room by herself.

The parent/teen relationship may shift a little during this age. For some, that may mean growing apart as a teen gains independence, but for others, teens may actually grow closer as their desire to be rebellious fades.

COGNITIVE DEVELOPMENT

By age 17, most teens have good organizational skills. Many teens are able to successfully juggle extracurricular activities, part-time jobs, and school work.

Although many 17 year olds think they're adults, their brains still aren't yet fully developed. So while they may have skills to regulate their impulses, they may still behave recklessly at times.

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Both males and females are fully developed by age 16. They've completed puberty and reached their full height.

Boys may still continue to develop muscles.

becomes an adult. Your parenting focus should be on ensuring your teen has the life skills she's going to need to be successful in the real world. Here are some steps you can take to make sure your teen is ready to become a responsible adult:

- Don't take your teen's need for independence personally. Letting go of your child may cause grief and sadness as she longer depends on you for her everyday life. But don't take her desire to be independent personally - it's a sign that she's developmentally right where she needs to be.
- Establish clear rules. It's still common for 17 year olds to test limits so it's important to maintain clear rules. Set a reasonable curfew and help your teen establish healthy habits.
- Follow through with consequences. When your teen breaks the rules, follow through with consequences. Take away privileges, assign extra responsibilities, or ground her from time with friends. Turn mistakes into healthy le arning opportunities.
- Continue ongoing conversations about safety. Although many teens know they should wear their seatbelts or they should avoid using drugs, peer pressure and impulsivity can lead to poor choices. Hold ongoing conversations about steps your teen can make to stay healthy and safe.
- Talk about your teen's future. By now, your teen should have some ideas about what she may want to do after high school. Volunteering, part-time jobs, job shadowing, and college visits are great ways to help your teen explore future career opportunities.
- **Expect a push/pull relationship.** There may be days where your teen wants you to know she still very much needs support. But there are also likely to be days where she tries to send the message she no longer needs you in her life. This is a normal part of the process.

In his letter to the Philippians, Paul tells his readers to ponder and value a

variety of things, including "whatever is true." Paul knows that our thinking about the truth will influence the way that we live in positive ways. Knowing the truth not only allows us to see and avoid embracing and following lies, but to grow in our faith and holiness. One of the biggest lies we believe is the lie which tells us that "the grass is always greener on the other side." We come to believe that if our circumstances were different our lives would be better. Counselor David Powlison reminds us that to flourish in life, we must reject all the lies containing the word different. For example, believing that our lives would improve drastically if we only had a different spouse or a different family. Powlison says that these statements are "fundamentally false." As you live through this month (February) where we are reminded to celebrate love, preach the truth of the Gospel to yourself. And rather than listening to the voice that would like you to forsake the relational gifts you've been given in favor of something that only appears to be better, remind yourself that God is control of His world and that He promises to show give you just what you need to navigate your circumstances and to decide to love your spouse and children well.

This has been pounded home to us over the course of the last several months as we continually hear about fake news. As parents and youth workers, we teach our kids how to discern what is true from what is false. We must also communicate the truths of God's Word in ways that help them to walk the narrow road that leaves to life, while avoiding the wide road that leads to destruction. The Apostle Paul uses the word "trustworthy" several times in his New Testament letters. In each case, his use of the word is in reference to a saying that is true, and that is to be completely accepted and believed. Are you searching the Scriptures in order to know the truth that is not only to be accepted and believed, but that gives life? Then, are you sharing that with your kids? How about taking the time to look at several of Paul's trustworthy sayings found in Scripture this month with your kids?

Tattoos, piercings, hair style, clothing. . . these are some of the things we tend to make into major conflict points in our families. For example, when generational styles collide, we tend to turn personal

taste and style issues into moral issues in an effort to keep our kids from altering their appearance in ways that we either find embarrassing or

wrong. Teens embrace their own unique styles that allow them to individuate as a distinct group away from previous generations. If you don't believe it, just go back and leaf through your high school yearbook. No doubt, this is fertile ground for parent/ teen conflict. On the one hand, these are issues and matters that we must address with our kids. But our first task is to discern the roots of the behaviors. If their fascination with these things isn't symptomatic of a deeper heart issue, then we shouldn't prohibit things that the Scriptures don't prohibit or label as wrong. The old parenting cliché is worth remembering: "Major on the majors. ... not the minors.'



Depression

Researchers recently released the results of what is called the Millennium Cohort Study. The academic survey was conducted in the U.K. The findings on depression

> should concern us. By the age of 14, nine percent of boys are depressed. That's alarming enough. But it's the numbers on our girls that are even

more distressing. By the age of 14, 24% of our girls are depressed. While depression, anxiety, and mental illness have always been present in the teen population, the frequency and intensity have increased. As parents, we must not only teach our kids how to deal in healthy ways with these things, but how to prevent and avoid them. One strategy is to spend less time on social media. Comparing ourselves to others leaves us feeling empty and consumed with trying to measure up. Our identity cannot be pursued and found in what others think of us. The path to mental and spiritual health begins with finding our identity in Christ.

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FINANCIAL NEWS

Treasurer's Report as of January 31, 2018

<u>2018 Annual Budget:</u> The 2018 Annual Budget was approved and will meet the expected growth occurring as a result of the New Sanctuary and increased Pastoral needs with our growing congregation.

<u>Operating Income and Expenses</u> are within the requirements of the Annual Budget with an unusual \$35,196 of Net Income over Expenses. Through the first month contributions greatly exceeded expectations probable due to the new tax law changes regarding charitable deductions. The primary reason for the \$35,197 of surplus for January was the transfer of \$26,250 of Prepaid Pledges received in December.

<u>Building Fund</u> The Building Fund Balance is \$204,343 and we are drawing funds from the Construction Loan. Loan funds to pay construction costs each month. During the month *Forward in Faith* donations totaled \$51,784. Building Fund expenses related to the new building were \$670,041 for the month.

<u>Fixed Assets</u> As construction progresses on the new building so will there be a significant increase in the value of the Fixed Asset for Building and Grounds. As of January the increase is \$2,594,318 higher than last year.
